Letters and Sounds

As a warm up, this is a game that we have played many times in class. It helps with speedy recognition of sounds.

Press **start**.

Press **individual graphemes** (a grapheme is a written sound)



I would suggest that you play 2 games.

Game 1 - Select all of Phase 2 and Phase 3 up to **z**, which are all of the single graphemes.

Game 2 - Select the digraphs that we have covered from **qu** to **igh**.

This will be a bit trickier. Again, please don't worry if you need to give a reminder at this stage.



I would then re-read the **igh** sound and words from yesterday before trying this next activity. There are then some sounds and an **igh** trigraph to cut out. If you say an igh word, can your child make it using the letters?



Now have a go at reading the sentence.

The picture is from a book called 'Can't You Sleep Little Bear' which we have read. The children might recognise the picture.

Find the **igh** words then read the sentence.

There is an **ee** to spot too. You could try writing it underneath in your neatest writing to practice your letter formation.

Number

We are leaving the subtraction today and looking instead at recognising and ordering numbers to 20 which is something that the children are expected to be able to do by the end of Early Years. To start you could listen again to any of the teen number songs from a couple of weeks ago, just as a teen number reminder.



There is also a **number recognition game** to try here.

Select numbers 1-20 but obviously if your child is less confident with number recognition at the moment, start with 1-10. Those that are more confident can choose more numbers!



Evil Pea numbers game



Part 1

Cut out the numbers, mix them up and then order them to 20 (to 10 first if this is a challenge).

Part 2

Whilst your child is covering their eyes, Evil Pea is going to steal one of the numbers. Mix them up again and by ordering them, can you work out which one he has stolen?


He could be really naughty and steal more than one number!

You could take it in turns to steal the numbers.

Although you may still have a number track to 20 that I have sent before, I have included another just in case your child needs to refer to it to help with the ordering.
