Is King Solomon the wisest person in the Bible? Some people think so. But he was also foolish. Solomon was the son of King David and the Bible says he was loved by God. When he became King of Israel, Solomon claimed more land. He tried to make the kingdom stronger with more soldiers.



Solomon asked God for wisdom, and God made him wise. He was able to judge difficult situations well. He helped his people as a result.

But Solomon did not always use his wisdom wisely. As he grew older, he did not do what God asked him to do. Solomon started worshipping other gods. After this, Israel had more enemies. When Solomon died, the kingdom was no longer united.

Solomon wrote the books of Ecclesiastes and Proverbs.

Paul's first name was Saul. He was born into a Jewish family in a place called Tarsus.

Paul was a tent-maker. He was also a Pharisee. Pharisees were a religious party in Biblical times who did not agree with many Christian beliefs.

When Paul was travelling to Damascus, he saw a vision of blinding light and became a Christian. After this, Paul stopped punishing Christians. He became an important person in the early church.



Paul spent most of his life punishing Christians. He might have done this because he thought they weren't following Jewish laws.

Paul travelled to many different places. He travelled to build churches and tell people about Jesus. In the end, he was arrested and put in prison for the things he did as a Christian.

Paul wrote long letters to different churches. The letters often included advice. These books are named after the church they were written to.

- The book of Galatians is the letter Paul wrote to the church in Galatia.
- Paul wrote thirteen letters: Romans, 1 Corinthians, 2 Corinthians, Galatians, Ephesians, Philippians, Colossians, 1 Thessalonians, 2 Thessalonians, 1 Timothy, 2 Timothy, Titus and Philemon.

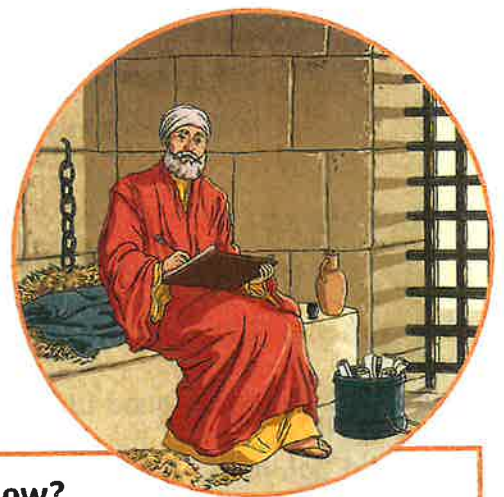

Bible Author Fact File – King David

To identify and compare different books of the Bible and their authors.

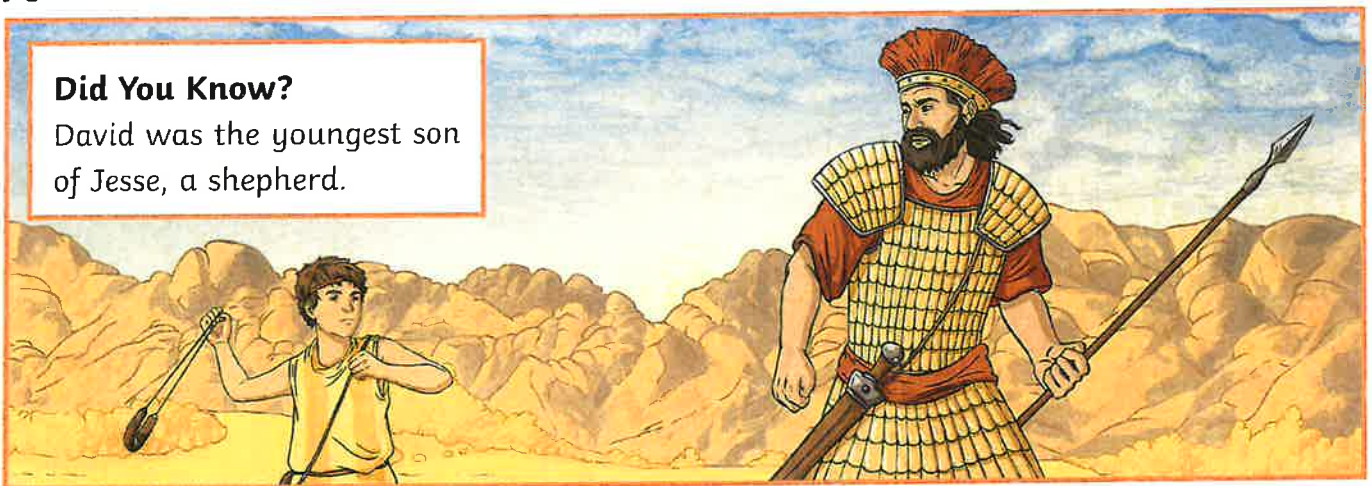
David was a king whose reign was remembered as a golden age for God's people. But he was not born a king...

Saul was King of Israel and God was not pleased with him. Israel had become a lawless place and Saul was not the leader God wanted for his people. So God sent a prophet, Samuel, to appoint the person who would be the new king: David.

David enjoyed music and singing, but he was quite small; he didn't exactly look like king material. But the Bible describes David as 'a man after God's heart'. In a battle in which Israel was facing fierce enemies, David showed his might. He faced the giant Goliath when no other fighter was brave enough and won the battle with only a slingshot.

Did You Know?

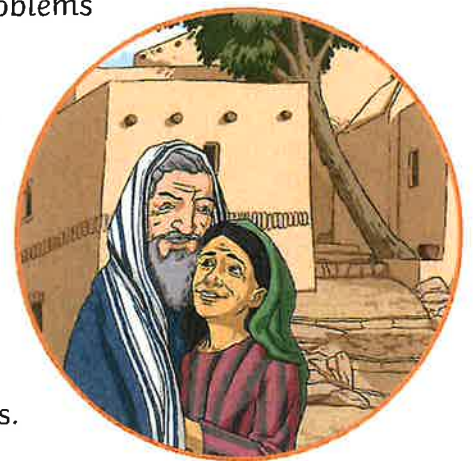
David was the youngest son of Jesse, a shepherd.



David became a great king who was known for trusting God even in difficult situations. He brought peace and prosperity to Israel. But he wasn't perfect: David became a little lazy in his role as king and faced a few problems as a result.

Music was David's thing, and so he wrote Psalms, songs or poems about God. Some of the Psalms he wrote are joyful and talk about how great he thought God was. But he wrote on bad days too, and so there are also Psalms full of questions and worries.

Although King David did not have a mighty end to his story, people remember him for the songs he wrote in the book of Psalms.





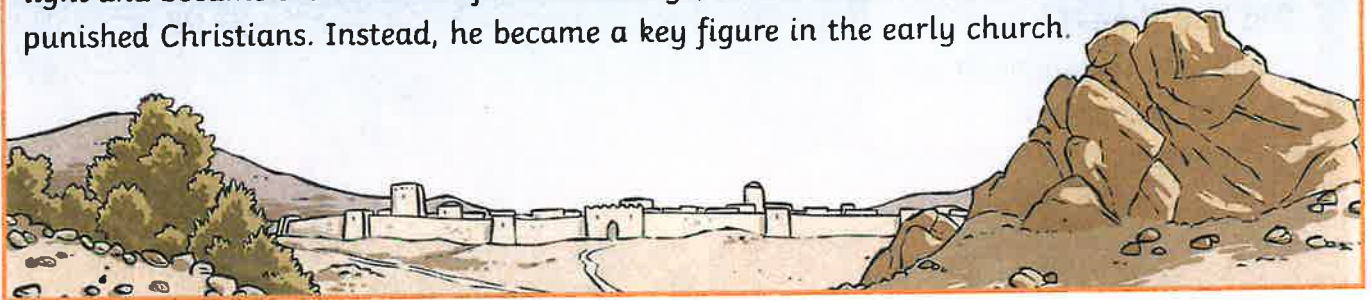
Bible Author Fact File – Paul

Paul's story is an interesting one. His first name was Saul and he was born into a Jewish family in a place called Tarsus. Some people think he was born at around the same time as Jesus was born.

Paul worked as a tent-maker and he could travel to many different places to do his work. He was a Pharisee. Pharisees were a religious party in Biblical times who believed in life after death but did not agree with many Christian beliefs. As he was a Pharisee, Paul spent much of his life punishing Christian believers. He might have done this because he thought they weren't observing the Jewish laws he thought they should.

But all this changed when Paul was travelling to Damascus. He saw a vision of blinding light and became a Christian. After this change, which is called a conversion, Paul no longer punished Christians. Instead, he became a key figure in the early church.



Paul travelled to many different places, but not to make tents. He travelled to establish churches and preach about Jesus to new believers. Paul's work in this area was not without consequence. He was arrested and imprisoned for his actions as a Christian.

Several books in the New Testament have Paul as their author. Even while he was in prison, Paul wrote long letters to different churches. The letters often included advice for how to live a good life as a Christian, and even included greetings and well wishes. These books are now known as the Letters section in the Bible and are each named after the church they were written to. For example, the book of Galatians is the letter Paul wrote to the church in Galatia.

The letters Paul wrote are use often in churches and in Christians' individual study of the Bible. He wrote thirteen letters in total: Romans, 1 Corinthians, 2 Corinthians, Galatians, Ephesians, Philippians, Colossians, 1 Thessalonians, 2 Thessalonians, 1 Timothy, 2 Timothy, Titus and Philemon.
